
ROAD SAFETY IN THAILAND: POLICE PERSPECTIVES

Road traffic accidents recently are viewed as a vital cause of injury in Thailand. The World Health Organization (WHO) estimated that, in the year 2020, road traffic accidents will be the third leading cause of injury in Thailand. In 2004, the number of road traffic accidents was 124,530. Then, it has been decreasing to 81,831 in 2010. The number of fatalities also has the same trend since 2003. There were 14,012 and 6,734 fatalities caused by road traffic accidents in 2003 and 2010 respectively. In addition, 94,364 people were injured in 2005. However, the number of injuries resulted from road traffic accidents has been decreasing since then and reaching the lowest level in 2010 (32,376).

The decreases in number of road traffic accidents, fatalities, and injuries are resulted from a good cooperation between public and private sectors which have launched various campaigns and projects to encounter with the problem. Traffic law enforcement is one of the major measures employed to cope with road traffic accidents in Thailand. Since the main cause of road traffic accidents is speeding, the Royal Thai Police has employed speed cameras to detect vehicle having speeds over the legal limit. In addition, other accident-related measures also have been enforced, such as, enforcement against drunk driving, running red light, not fastening seat belt, not wearing helmet, and etc. Enforcement against running red light is the most recent usage of technology to facilitate the enforcement of traffic law. However, it stills having some limitations.

Besides enforcing the traffic law, police also places high attention on other activities in order to raise awareness of road safety not only for children and teenagers but also for other people in both public and private sectors. Various training programs have been provided for such purpose. In addition, police is now seeking cooperation with other related agencies to launch various campaigns in order to reduce the number of road traffic accidents, fatalities, and injuries as well as to raise road safety awareness.

Even the number of road traffic accidents, fatalities, and injuries as been decreasing in the recent years, such numbers are still very high. The police and other related agencies are, therefore, trying hard to reduce it as a minimal.









ENFORCEMENT AGIANST DRUNK DRIVING (1)

- Amendment of Road Traffic Act B.E.2522 by increasing penalties and fines (Effective in 2007)
 - Intoxication: An imprisonment for a period not exceeding 1 year or a fine of 5,000 to 20,000 Baht or both, and at least 6-month driving ban or suspension of driving license.
 - Intoxication and Causation of a Slight Injury: Imprisonment for a period of 1-5 years and a fine of 20,000-100,000 Baht, and at least 1-year driving ban or suspension of driving license.

ENFORCEMENT AGIANST DRUNK DRIVING (2)

- Intoxication and Causation of Serious Injury: 2-6 years imprisonment and a fine of 40,000 – 120,000 Baht, and at least 2-year driving ban or suspension of driving license.
- Intoxication and Causation of Death: An imprisonment for a period 3-10 years and a fine of 60,000-200,000
 Baht and suspend of driving license.


